

 - N=225 per: Florida, New Jersey+New York
 - N=300 California
 - N=350 All other US
- Field Dates: May 8-22, 2024
- English or Spanish, according to preference
- Mixed mode: 75% online, 25% live telephone interview

Latino Support For Protecting The Ocean Remains Strong




Boston and New England Latinos are still concerned about conserving the ocean

Increasing Access To The Ocean Is A Priority

While Latinos strongly believe the ocean should be open to everyone, a high share (49%) say it is too expensive for the average person to enjoy and (53%) claimed to have not felt welcomed and experienced hostility.

Across the three questions, the total agree responses remain the majority since the 2022 survey.




The Coast and Ocean As A Source Of Economic and Personal Vitality







Offshore Drilling Threatens Community Health


Over half of Latinos regard offshore oil and natural gas drilling as a risk to the health and wellbeing of their community.





Increase Ocean Protections / Switching To Renewable Energy






Latinos Support Drilling Ban, Even If It Means Paying More At The Pump

Latinos Support Efforts to Combat Illegal Fishing, **Even If It Means Paying More For Fish**

Latinos in New England and Boston are willing to take action to protect the environment. 71% support banning offshore oil and natural gas drilling, even if it means paying more for gasoline and household gas.



73% of Latino Voters in New England and **Boston support** national and international efforts to combat illegal fishing, even if it means paying more for fish at the grocery store or restaurants.
